TEACHING AND LEARNING IN MEDICINE

Gonzalo, JD et al. (2009). Attending Rounds and Bedside Case Presentations: Medical Student and Medicine Resident Experiences and Attitudes. *Teaching and Learning in Medicine*, 21(2), 105 - 110

Describes how time spent learning at the bedside is less than in the past, despite the student belief that it is worthwhile.

David Prideaux, Professor and Head of the Department of Medical Education in the School of Medicine at Flinders University, gives an overview of the current state of medical education in Australia in **Medical Teacher**, 31(2) 96-100. **Medical education in Australia: Much has changed but what remains?** There are some very good articles in this Medical Teacher issue (volume 31 issue 2) on topics such as the following: teaching critical thinking to med students, 12 tips on acting on student evaluations of learning experience, The power of one: Looking beyond the teacher in clinical instruction (co-written by Peter Harris of SPHCM, UNSW). SOTL and Professional Development

New to UNSW- Master of Philosophy (MPhil) in Higher Education degree

The Master of Philosophy in Higher Education (MPhil HE) is a research degree with a coursework component designed to develop the research capability and scholarly practice of those who teach, work or lead in higher education. This program will provide an opportunity for candidates who have completed postgraduate study in higher education (which includes, but is not limited to, studies in university learning and teaching or educational leadership), or who have extensive work experience in higher education to extend their development beyond scholarly understanding and practice to include the capacity to conduct research within an area of interest in higher education. These areas might include teaching and learning in higher education, technology enabled learning and teaching, educational innovation, assessment, curriculum, evaluation, language and literacy or student diversity, as well as academic leadership, management and policy.

This program will complement existing programs offered at UNSW including the [Graduate Certificate in University Learning and Teaching](#); the Master of Education, and Master of Educational Leadership programs.

In addition, the program has a strong strategic purpose for UNSW where a key focus is to develop the capability of UNSW staff to engage in research in learning and teaching and to increase publication in this area. In particular, the program aims to provide support for more experienced staff who are in, or aspiring to be in, leadership positions in learning and teaching, to develop the capability for research in this area.

To enhance the potential of the program to fulfil key strategic objectives for UNSW, the proposed MPhil (HE) program has been awarded funding from the Learning and Teaching Performance Fund for scholarships for staff at UNSW who propose to undertake research into areas that have been identified as priorities in learning and teaching for UNSW.
